Last year's posters aimed to address issues in our local ACT community. This year we want to continue that theme and use the data we gather to bring about real change.

Your Task

Your task for home learning this week is to begin to investigate the issues that are evident in the ACT community. You could:

- Look through local newspapers and scrapbook articles of interest
- Interview friends and family to discover the issues that they have recognised
- Go for a walk with your family and see if you can find an issue in your local community that needs addressing
- Research the election promises from the last ACT election. What promises were made to better our community?



MATHS

Maths is everywhere! This week we would like you to investigate the maths of the ACT. Understanding the numbers will better help you understand and address the issues that matter. You could:

- Investigate the population of the ACT
- Investigate maps and the design of the ACT
- Look at the number of school students in the ACT compared with the number of schools
- Look at the geographical layout of the ACT
- Investigate the number of registered motor vehicles in the ACT
- Find out the total length of bike paths in the ACT
- Estimate the number of street lights in the ACT
- Calculate the number of supermarkets in the ACT
- Investigate the average age of residents in the ACT
- Investigate employment levels in the ACT

The options are endless. If you're stuck for ideas, be sure to talk with a parent or your teacher.
